From the Club President

The Club enjoyed another successful season despite ongoing disruption of Covid-19.

We kicked off the summer with our new clubhouse opening event – our third attempt – which saw a great turnout from our ever-growing membership base. The Club finally got to experience our fantastic social space.

Of course, the plan was to hold regular social events over the peak summer period, with sunset drinks, brunches, and weekend events planned. Unfortunately, Covid interrupted our plans yet again. We were forced to cancel our summer Bronze Camp, numerous Nipper sessions, remaining social activities, and close the kiosk for a while.

Despite this, the resilience of our membership base and the positive support we felt was simply fantastic, and we re-grouped. For the first time, we held our Bronze Camp following the Easter holiday. Cold water and a big swell met the participants, yet we had a very successful camp with over 90% of those booked for the summer camp attending.

Following the peak summer period, we struggled for numbers on patrol. This placed undue pressure on too few to maintain an active presence on the beach, thus we had four members contribute over 200 hours. Indeed, they were included in the top four in the state, a tremendous and greatly appreciated achievement.

Notably, our membership grew from 550 to more than 1,200. A key driver of this growth came from our local community keen to become involved with the club on a social level.

In that context, several weddings and functions have



been held at the club this year. Despite our lack of experience in holding large events at the club, they were a huge success, not in small part because we are very fortunate to have engaged Copper Door Kitchen to manage the functions and events on the Club's behalf.

The Club is currently in a strong financial position, however we still have several additional expenses to incur to complete the clubhouse build and fit-out. Having now operated in it for a season, a few additions have been identified to improve the final product. Once we have a complete understanding of the costs of running and maintaining the building, we intend to review our financial position with a view to maintain the cost of membership as low as possible while developing a fund to support community and active member growth.

On reflection, it was a successful season despite the challenges, and I thank everyone who contributed. We are learning a lot about our new clubhouse given it is the first season we have been able to use it properly.

Going forward, we have an ambitious agenda to further develop our club and our membership. We recently held two strategic planning sessions to capture the issues, challenges, opportunities, and ideas of the committee and key active members. From this we will develop our Club's five-year strategic plan.

This season, we saw approximately 26,524 people visit our beach during our patrolling hours. During this time, our active members patrolled a combined total of 3619.26 Andrew N 130hrs, Terry P 220hrs, Sarah P 244hrs, voluntary hours; they did 2674 preventative actions; completed 27 minor first aid cases; one major first aid case, and one rescue. We continue to be very proud of these statistics each summer and are so grateful to have such a dedicated patrolling team to keep our beach safe.

Our patrol would not function to the exceptional standard it does without the hard work of our Beach Operations Committee. To support the active role of the Club Captain things next season! and Vice Club Captain, this committee consists of our Patrol Captains: Liam, Moara, Chaz, and Andrew, and our Vice Patrol Captains: Jess, Terry, Josh, and Sarah. We are so thankful for the countless hours they have volun-

tarily contributed to our club, and know we are lucky to have you all involved.

Equally, we are incredibly grateful for every person that contributed their time to patrol the beach this season, no matter how small or great. Everyone played an important role to ensure we were able to flag the beach each weekend.

However, we do want to make a special mention to the active members that patrolled more than 100 voluntary hours. We had some phenomenal numbers this year: Josh K 108hrs, Samantha D 117hrs, Cormac H 123hrs, Liam M 284hrs and Aly S 302hrs.

As ever, thank you for contributing so much of your spare time to assist our club and the community of Cape Paterson.

From the Chief Instructor

Another season, done and dusted! 2021-22 proved to be another challenging summer, with COVID rearing its head at us once again. It was nothing we couldn't handle, though, as our community came together to support one and other and show just why Cape is so great.

As has become customary, kicking off the season of training was the Koo Wee Rup Secondary College Bronze Camp – we were delighted to welcome them back to our clubhouse and beach yet again. We offered 17 students the chance to gain their Bronze Medallion and understand what it means to wear the Red and Yellow and service the community.

The Club also took the opportunity to re-train nine KWRSC staff and regualify their awards. This was the first camp we were able to offer accommodation on-site and it was a fantastic week full of laughter, training, and leadership. We would like to thank Koo Wee Rup Secondary College for the ongoing partnership we share and look forward to welcoming them back next season.

Our first requal day of the season was attended by 11 Surf Rescue Certificate holders, and 27 Bronze Medallion holders, nine of whom regualified their Advanced Resuscitation Award, 17 their IRB Crew certificate, and five their Silver Medallion IRB Driver certificate.

Then came the Summer Bronze and SRC week ...

What was initially anticipated as an amazing week of training and development was quickly undone by Covid charging through our community, sidelining numerous trainers and candidates. myself included. To keep our community safe, and have adequate planning time, the

difficult decision was made to move the program to the Term 1 school holidays.

However, this resulted in our candidates having some pretty heinous weather to contend with in April swells. In my absence, Charlie Crawford-Rust stepped in as Chief Instructor and, with the help of our training squad, delivered a great six-day course. Cape Paterson SLSC gained 29 new Bronze Medallion holders, as well as 12 Surf Rescue Certificate holders. We congratulate the candidates on their efforts and look forward to seeing them patrolling the beach this coming season.

With the rearrangement of the Bronze program affecting our usual feeder into the Labour Day Weekend IRB camp, we elected to postpone this program for the 2021-22 period and will be excited to offer this course for our members in the coming season.

Looking forward, we are very excited for 2022-23.

The Club will be restarting the Adult Bronze Medallion program (starting 15 September), offering First Aid and Advanced Resuscitation training, and introducing the new Silver Medallion Patrol Captain award.

Thank you as always to our band of support members who continue to put their hand up to help the Training area succeed. We couldn't offer the quality of courses that we do without your help and continue to be grateful for the community spirit that is imbued on the Club year in, year out.

Nipper numbers were very strong again this season with 225 participants, including a healthy number of first-timers. Interestingly, there was a relatively high number of Nippers who did not return this season, our assumption being that some families chose to travel far and wide once Covid restrictions were removed leading into summer. We will likely learn more next season.

The Nipper season was of course pandemic affected, forcing the cancellation and re-scheduling of several sessions. Despite this, the Nippers, age managers, parent helpers, and water safety showed great resilience and understanding throughout. It was another fantastic season.

This year we held our first Starfish Nippers program. This is the modified Nippers program that can run alongside all our regular sessions, designed as a lifesaving skills program for children and young adults with a disability (six years and older). The program aims to give young people with disabilities beach safety and water awareness skills.

Our ability to have both programs available for families ensures all children the opportunity to engage in

Nippers, and it's a wonderful addition to our summer schedule.

Yes, Starfish numbers were small, but their commitment was huge, such that they engaged in all the Nippers activities. At times we had more members offering to help than Starfish participants, which shows how committed we are to access for all at Cape Paterson we hope to expand our Starfish pro-gram further next season.

The program also hosted children from Interchange Gippsland, who had travelled great distances to spend a day engaging in land and water activities (plus lots of rides in the ATV!). The half-day event provided the children with a great experience at the beach and we hope to have them return to join us for Starfish Nippers next season. The support we had from our members to ensure a safe, fun and smooth running of the program was fantastic.

Finally, a huge thank you to everyone involved in the Nipper program. We are very fortunate to have so many enthusiastic and engaged members involved in delivering a great program for our kids.

From the IRB Captain

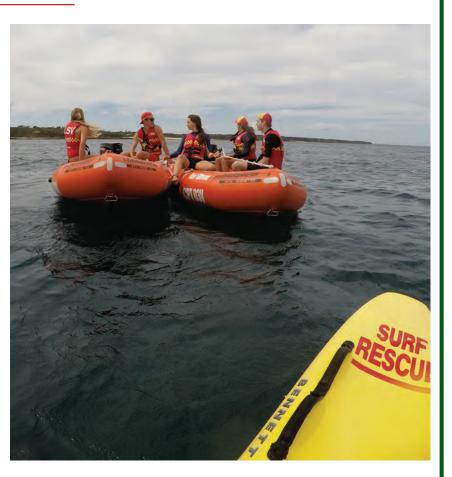
It has been a good season for boats. Our boats and motors are all in good condition with only small amounts of regular maintenance required throughout the season to keep them in operational order.

From the Treasurer

The 2021-22 season reflects the full year of operations after the completion of the new clubhouse during Q4 2020. However, our activities continue to be adversely impacted by Covid-19, despite the partial winding back of restrictions late in 2021.

The Club recorded an operating income of \$183,145, with expenses of \$146,205 providing a surplus of \$36,940 (net of GST). Actual cash in the bank at the end of our financial year (30 April 2022) totalled \$557,026.

All residual contractual expenses associated with building and commissioning the new clubhouse have been met. The balance sheet shows the Club is carrying no ongoing financial liabilities. The total assets of the Club (cash at bank, residual value of lifesaving equipment, and the clubhouse build cost) are recorded at \$5.34 million.

The income and expenditure statement highlights the major sources of income and the expenses incurred to support the operation of the Club. The key income streams are the Commercial events, our own Functions and Fundraising activities, Leisure Apparel sales, Grants, and Member subscriptions. The following are the key contributors to our income:

Commercial Events: \$19,955

The new clubhouse has been designed with the objective of generating venue from Commercial Events.

In the first six months of events since November 2021, the function hall hosted six wed-dings, four birthdays and 14 corporate events.

Functions & Fundraising: \$36,789

As well as the Commercial events, the Club has run its own functions. The major events have been (i) New Year Clubhouse Opening, (ii) Sunset Drinks, (iii) the Bronzelow evening, totalling \$7,996.

Other significant sources of income include:

- Kiosk Sales \$13,024
- Tavern Raffle \$7,307
- Trivia Night \$6,926
- Snail Races \$1,536

Apparel: \$23,046

The income from apparel sales is attributed to leisure apparel only and does not include patrol gear, Nipper singlets or 'Age Manager' polos.

Grants: \$39,194

Emergency Management Vic. (VESEP): \$13,603.

Expended: Resuscitation training manikins, First-aid equipment, Beach equipment trailers.

Beach Safety Equipment Fund (SLSA): \$15,000.

Expended: Training equipment & supplies, Defibrillator, Rescue Tubes and Fins, First Aid supplies.

Dept. Jobs, Precinct & Regions (Vic. Govt): \$1,364

Expended: Patrol Uniforms.

Bass Coast Shire Council: \$1,727.

Expended: Equipment maintenance tools.

Life Saving Victoria: \$7,500.

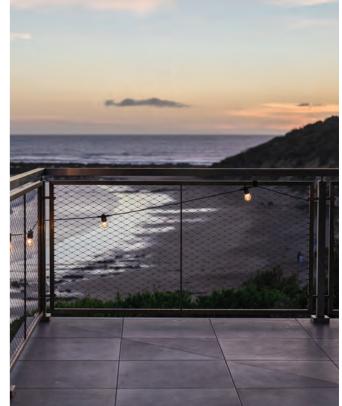
Expended: Club Administration Support.

Membership: \$32,045

The Club membership has increased over the past year from approx. 600 to 1250. Each year our Nipper membership has grown but the attraction of the new clubhouse and the social events such as Sunset Drinks on the balcony have significantly boosted the numbers of associate members, particularly from the Cape Paterson and Wonthaggi district.

With the outbreak of the Covid-19 virus pandemic in 2020, the Victorian Government (through Life Saving Victoria) mandated restrictions on Club activities. The subscription rates for the different Membership categories were reduced for that year and were again held at 50% for the 2021-2022 season.

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The Season Ahead

A financial priority for the year ahead is to fully identify and capture the costs associated with man-aging the new clubhouse, co-incident with running the core lifesaving activities of the Club. We have not yet experienced a normal year of operations (i.e. free of Covid-19) to adequately gauge the impact on income and expenses of running the Club.

Our objectives are to further promote the function hall as a desirable event venue. We do not see the Club reverting to holding sausage sizzles outside the supermarket, conducting tin rattles in Wonthaggi, or running door-knocks around Cape Paterson in order to realise the necessary funds to run the Club.

To enable more effective tracking of income, the Club will introduce the use of programmable 'Square' point of sale devices in place of the generic, bank supplied, EFT-POS units. The chart of accounts in our Quickbooks financial system will be updated to more clearly identify the contributions from the kiosk, the bar, apparel sales and function hall income, and their associated expenses.

The Club's accounts have again been audited by Cardell Assurance and Audit and their report is enclosed.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2022

NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the provisions of the rules of the association and the financial reporting requirements of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report is prepared on a cash basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the prior period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

a. Income Tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

b. Plant & equipment

Leasehold improvements and plant & equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all assets is depreciated over their estimated useful lives to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The land is leased from the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning under the Land (Surf Life Saving Association) Act 1967 and an annual rental expense is paid to Bass Coast Shire Council. The current lease has been extended for a further 20 years.

The depreciation rates used for each class of assets are:

Class of fixed asset	Depreciation Rate
Leasehold Improvements	2.5 – 15% Straight Line
Equipment	20 - 30% Straight Line

c. Impairment of assets

At each reporting date, the committee reviews the carrying value of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expenses to the income statement.

d. Revenue

> Revenue is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

> Grant revenue is recognised in the income and expenditure statement when the entity obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be reliably measured. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied. As a result, any unexpended balance of the grant will be recorded at unexpended grant income at the end of the financial year.

e. Goods and Services Tax

The club is registered for GST. Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.

NOTE 2: FINANCIAL COMMITMENTS

At the date of this report, there are no significant financial commitments.

NOTE 3: LEASE

The land where the club operates from is leased from the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning under the Land (Surf Life Saving Association) Act 1967 with annual rental paid to the Bass Coast Shire Council. Following the addition of three minor clauses by DELWP, the lease agreement has been approved by the Bass Coast Shire Council and we await final sign-off by DELWP.

NOTE 4: COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The Cape Paterson SLSC has complied with COVID-19 restrictions issued by the State Government with the assistance of procedural advice from Life Saving Victoria. The majority of COVID-19 restrictions were relaxed by the State Government during the latter part of 2021. Beach patrols, life-saver training and Club functions were resumed during the summer months with only minor restrictions remaining in place.

NOTE 5: SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

There are no subsequent events to be reported as at the date of this report.

Qualified Opinion
