Our membership was just shy of 1,200, which is a fantastic result. With Life Saving Victoria extending the length of the season, more pressure was placed on our active members to volunteer their time to patrol our beach. We have been pleasantly surprised how quickly the clubhouse has developed a reputation as a premium wedding and events venue, both within the Bass Coast region and across the Greater Melbourne area. This result is a consequence of its location, unsurpassed views, and quality facilities, as well as how the functions and events are run and managed. Jenna

and Carly have certainly developed a great team that represents the club well, such that the volume of forward bookings is simply amazing. The next wedding season is virtually booked out!

For the first time in three years, we also managed to hold the Cape Aquathon. With record entries, great conditions and a swag of volunteers, the event was a great success. Again, thank you to all that contributed.

I also need to acknowledge the family of volunteers that make our Club what it is; the committee, our active members, and those members who give their time to help where they can. This was the first season that we were truly able to settle into our new digs without external interruptions.

Thank-you to the many volunteers that help make the Cape Paterson Surf Life Saving community, particularly to those who volunteered in the kiosk, for our social events, and on the merchandise stand. This contributes greatly to the culture and our community as well as raising funds to support our lifesaving operations.

# From the Club Captain

**Wow – what a year! From the scorching heat of the summer to the wild weather we endured from March onwards, our patrollers were showing up and raising the red and yellow flags on our beach.**

We had some challenging moments trying to get the ATV and trailers up the soft sand of the track before the local council kindly performed some earthmoving for us. The damage for the season was minimal, with a trailer axle and an outboard prop assembly being the only victims.

The 2022-23 season saw our members patrol the beach for a total of 2,930 hours, supervising approximately 21,000 visitors to our beach. This is an incredible feat and we should all be very proud of our active members who contributed to this. We attended a substantial 150 minor first aid cases, 12 major first aids, and completed 3 rescues. The impact that our members have on the Cape Paterson community is clearly meaningful and immense.

This year we trialled a new patrol rostering system, using TeamApp, the intent being to move towards a more fluid system of timetabling. Feedback from our members was positive – we saw a dramatic increase in the total number of members logging patrol hours for the season, as well as a greater distribution of total hours among members. We will continue to innovate how we operate as a club and ensure our active members are welcomed and supported to be a part of our club.

We would like to thank all members who took on extra responsibility this season as a Patrol Captain, Vice Patrol Captain, or other leaders and mentors. The dedication these members continue to show is inspiring and greatly appreciated by all our active members.

Included in this report is a list of all our members who patrol hours this season. This includes hours spent on patrol as well as hours volunteering as water safety for training, Nippers, or events. Please take the time to read the list of names and appreciate the amazing dedication these members show to the club.

Of note, we had 13 members volunteer more than 100 hours of their time, with Liam, Aly, and Charlie giving over 200 hours.

On behalf of the club, we would like to thank our members who continue to dedicate their time and skills to the operation of Cape Paterson SLSC. Your contribution is recognised and valued.

**We have been graced with another fantastic year for our equipment. Although there were a few 'hiccups', as they say, the vast majority of our equipment is in great operational order. It truly says something about our club's attitude and care towards our gear when most of our equipment is older than our clubhouse!**

This past year we've increased maintenance efforts to keep our ageing flotilla of boards seaworthy, completing a lot of patch jobs that have been building up over the last few seasons. On the horizon is an overhaul of these boards, grants pending.

Our training, patrol and nipper gear experienced a storage revamp, with a new system in place to revolutionise how we stay organised. Hopefully this will reduce the time spent looking for and replacing gear.

As some of you may have noticed, our ATVs also received a small upgrade, looking oh-so-professional now with the boards on the roof. This was done to bring our ATVs up to spec and increase our response time to water-based incidents. Excitingly, we also have a brand-new ATV on the way, which will be ready for the 2023-24 season. Name applications are open...

Now, onto the fun stuff...the Bangs, Breaks and Bandages. With the season's equipment highs, we had a few minor catastrophic failures.

We started the season with access troubles on the beach track. Years of use, combined with hot weather, was a recipe to create a 'bogable' mess with several instances of our ATVs getting stuck. Thankfully, the Bass Coast Shire responded to our plea for assistance and dug out the top layer of sand, creating a brilliant surface for ease of access to First Surf.

A rescue board got dumped by a shorej just one too many times – no amount of silicon or resin will be quite enough to glue the two halves back together, while our gear trailer hit a small speedbump – the semi-submerged post of the ramp, really – prompting a couple of weekends of hassle while we got things straightened out (quite literally – thanks Doogs!). We'd also like to extend our thanks to Scott Ivey from TTG, who provided us with a replacement axle, as well as some advice not to drive this one into a fence post.

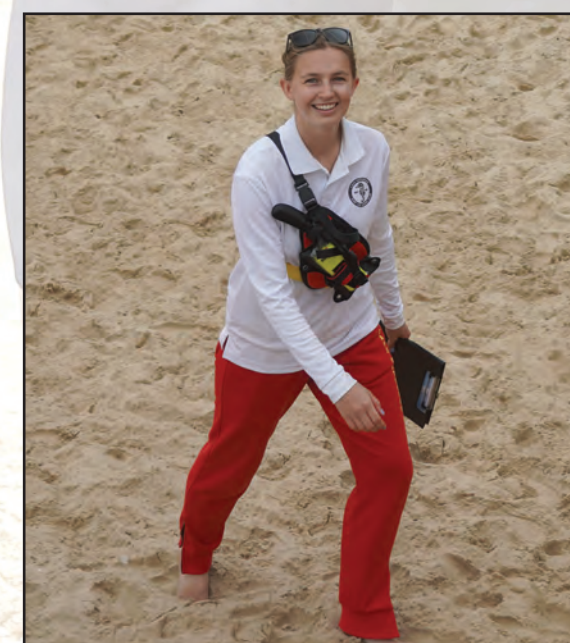

# From the Treasurer

The 2022-23 season reflects the full year of operations. The Club recorded an operating income of \$218,245, an increase of 19% on the previous year. Expenses excluding depreciation totalled \$154,573, resulting in a net surplus before depreciation of \$63,910 (2022: \$36,940).

The 2022-2023 saw an increase in income from grants, aquathon fees and apparel sales.

At 30 April 2023, the Club has total current assets comprising cash at bank of \$560,141. Total assets including cash, equipment, and buildings (less depreciation) total \$5.24 million. The Club has minimal liabilities.

The main sources of income for the Club during the financial year are detailed in the accompanying pie chart, while the following are the key contributors to our income:

## Grants \$49,164

Thanks to the efforts of the Treasurer, Keith Bartel, the Club has been the beneficiary of a number of grants which have assisted in the purchase of equipment and funding towards club operations.

## Member subscriptions \$35,781

Member subscriptions increased slightly since the previous year.

## Apparel sales \$36,472

This relates to sales of leisure wear and does not include patrol uniforms or nippers uniforms. The sales have increased by approx. \$13,400 year-on-year with members proud to show they are the member of the Club by wearing a variety of club-branded merchandise.

## Club functions and fundraising \$37,793

The sources of income include the trivia night (\$7.4K), raffles (\$9.9K), kiosk operations \$14.2K, and other functions including sunset New Years Eve, snail races, and sunset drinks. Club functions have been well attended by members and their guests.

## Commercial events \$31,427

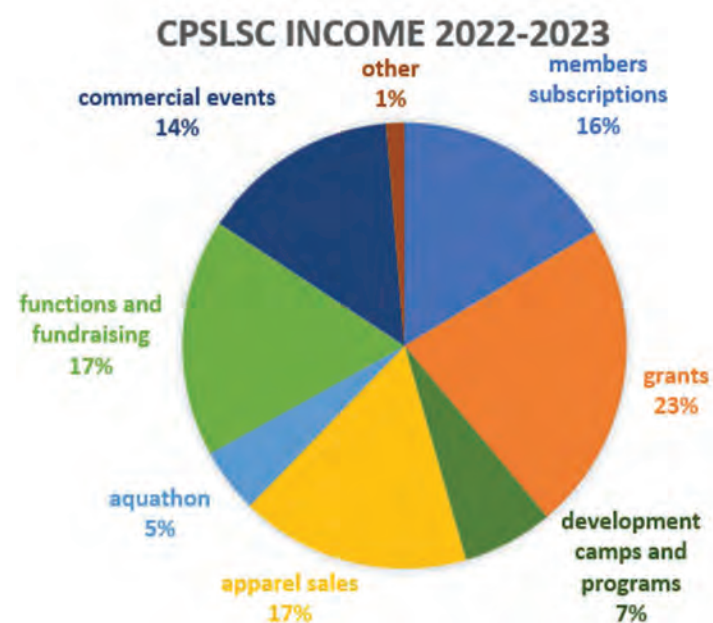
The clubhouse continues to be a popular as a venue for functions and events.

## NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the provisions of the rules of the association and the financial reporting requirements of the *Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012*. The committee has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

The financial report is prepared on a cash basis and is based on historical costs and does not take into account changing money values.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the prior period unless otherwise stated, have been adopted in the preparation of this financial report:

a. **Income Tax**

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997*.

b. **Plant & equipment**

Leasehold improvements and plant & equipment are carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation. The depreciable amount of all assets is depreciated over their estimated useful lives to the association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are amortised over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful lives of the improvements. The land is leased from the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning under the *Land (Surf Life Saving Association) Act 1967* and an annual rental expense is paid to Bass Coast Shire Council. The current lease has been extended for a further 20 years – refer Note 3.

The depreciation rates used for each class of assets are:

c. **Impairment of assets**

At each reporting date, the committee reviews the carrying value of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expenses to the income statement.

d. **Revenue**

Revenue is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

Grant revenue is recognised in the income and expenditure statement when the entity obtains control of the grant and it is probable that the economic benefits gained from the grant will flow to the entity and the amount of the grant can be reliably measured. If conditions are attached to the grant which must be satisfied before it is eligible to receive the contribution, the recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied. As a result, any unexpended balance of the grant will be recorded at unexpended grant income at the end of the financial year.

e. **Goods and Services Tax**

The club is registered for GST. Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office (ATO). In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.



As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.
